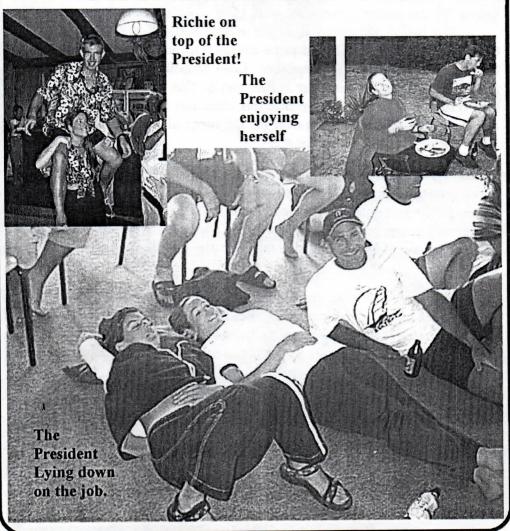

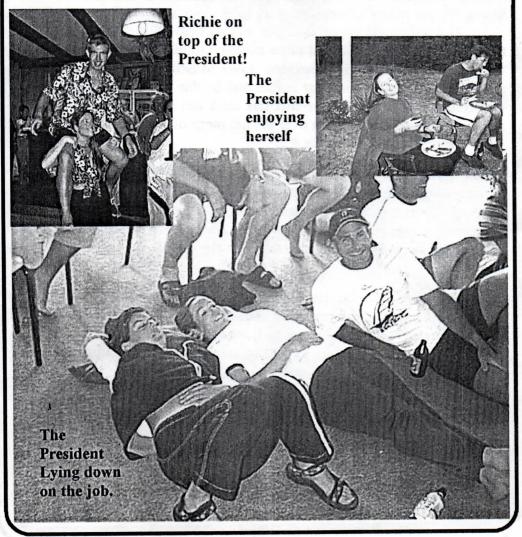

B14 AUSTRALIAN TITLES 2001

Article prepared for Australian Sailing

A thoroughly professional display by the enthusiastic members of the MaCrae Yacht Club laid the foundation for an ideal B14 National Championship on Port Phillip Bay between the 2nd and 6th January 2001. The race committee's experience and knowledge of the local conditions resulted in excellent courses, starting lines and manipulation of the program to make the best of both the early morning Northerlies and afternoon sea breezes.

The series was dominated by young crew James Bury and Jake Christian, sailing "Firestopping". Over nine races their worst result and drop was a 3rd place. The rest of the fleet fought out a close battle with 4 boats going into the last race sailing for second place overall. Of the 6 crew members aboard the first three boats, 3 were women. Lissa McMillan and Richie Reynolds (The Nude) were 2nd and Abby Parkes and Sophie Hunt (Hunt Leather) 3rd. The results are clear evidence that this class can be sailed equally well by men, women or a combination over the full range of wind conditions.

A variety of conditions ensued ranging from a dying Northerly morning breeze through to several gear testing, 20 knot Southerly sea breezes. *Firestopping* won 5 of the 9 races leaving no doubt that they were worthy winners. The remainder of the fleet contested 2nd place with several boats in contention at the outset of the last race. *The Nude* won the final, shiftiest race of the series by playing the shifts up the middle, to secure 2nd place overall.

Abby Parkes and Sophie Hunt showed the benefit of a well constructed training program to finish one point ahead of tied 4th placegetters. All of the three placegetters intend to travel to Lake Garda in Italy for the B14 World Titles in August in an effort to restore some Aussie pride after the British teams dominated last year's World Title on Sydney Harbour.

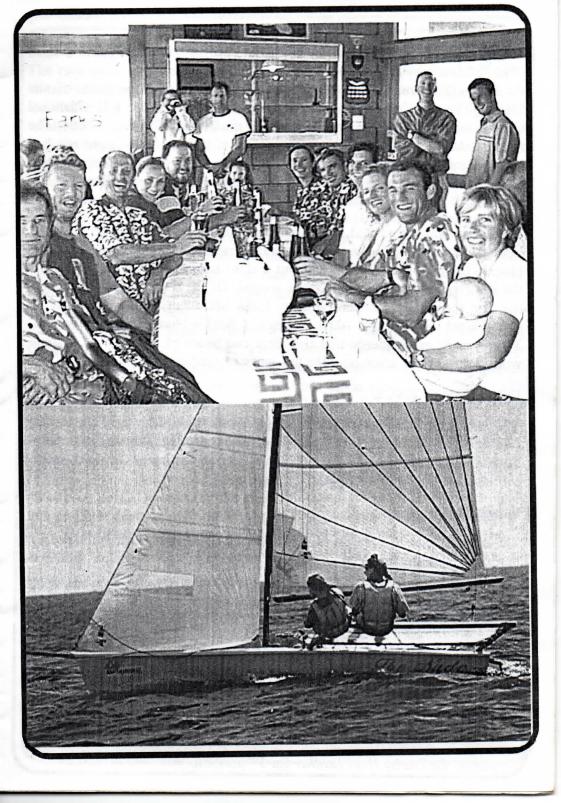

B14 AUSTRALIAN TITLES 2001

(The full story by James)

Lissa McMillan and Richie Reynolds (The Nude) were 2nd and Abby Parkes and Sophie Hunt (Hunt Leather) 3rd. These results are evidence that this class can be sailed equally well by men, women or a combination over the full range of wind conditions.

INVITATION RACE

The invitation race was sailed in a light 5-10 knot NE with *Firestopping* leading from the 1st mark and demonstrating their ability to stay in pressure downwind in order to take the race out by almost 5 minutes. This dominance set the scene for the remainder of the regatta.

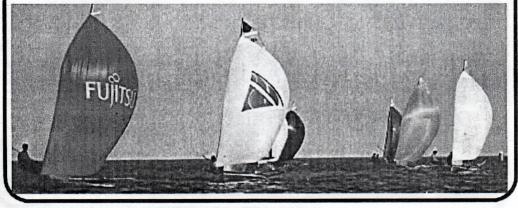
RACE 1

The opening race of the regatta was a morning race sailed in a 5-15 knot SW breeze which gradually strengthened during the race. Fujitsu, sailed by Julian Bolleter and Chris Madin, timed a perfect start at the boat end of the line to lead Firestopping, Hunt Leather and Priority Powder Coating at the 1st mark. They maintained their lead and on the 2nd work Fujitsu and Firestopping sailed a tactical race up the middle. Priority Powder Coating (left) and White Pointer (right) benefited from working the sides making it a 4 boat race at the end of the 2nd beat. Firestopping eased ahead downwind to lead at the bottom mark but Priority Powder Coating hit the left side of the course again up the 3rd work to pick up a small shift and a race winning lead. Firestopping performed the first of their recovery acts by coming from 4th back to 2nd over the last lap of the race, with The Nude only just being pipped on the line by Hunt Leather for 3rd position.

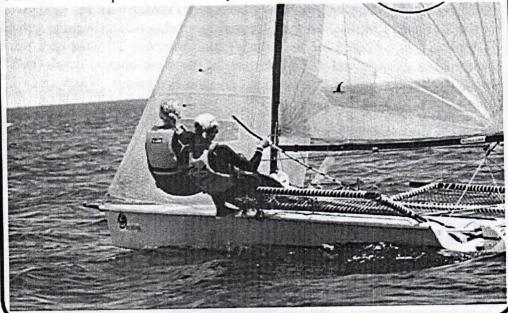
Race 2 brought the first of the promised sea breezes with a 15-20 knot SE. The race committee settled on the windward/ leeward course for the 1st time in the series and Chris Rodawicz and Duncan Rutherford blasted off the leeward end of the line in *Brickmans' Wines* heading straight for the shore on the left side of the course to lead at the 1st mark. *Priority Powder Coating* and *Firestopping* were close behind with nudists Richie and Lissa rejoining the race down the 1st downwind leg with their usual exceptional downwind speed. *Brickmans' Wines, Firestopping* and *Priority Powder Coating* again eased away from the lightweight nudists upwind only to see them again rejoin the race on the 2nd downwind leg. The final lap saw *Brickmans' Wines* and *Firestopping* crossing tacks up and downwind with *Firestopping* leading *Brickmans' Wines* to the finish by the length of their spinnaker pole. *The Nudists* again flew back into the race to take 3rd from *Priority Powder Coating* who overlaid the lay line and struggled to reach back to the finish.

RACE 3

Race 3 was sailed back to back with Race 2 and in the same strong conditions, *Brickmans' Wines*, *Firestopping*, *The Nudists* and *Priority Powder Coating* again fought for the lead in what was by now a solid 20 knot SE breeze. The left hand (shore) side again proved favourable with *Firestopping* and *Brickmans' Wines* consolidating their lead at the end of the 2nd work. Abby and Sophie in *Hunt Leather* showed the benefit of their heavy weather training to come back into the race, despite their light weight, pulling back the much heavier crew of *Priority Powder Coating* by the end of the 2nd work. *Priority Powder Coating* began what was to become a trend (2 broken centre boards for the regatta) soon after the 2nd windward mark before *Hunt Leather* and *The Nude* also hit the drink coming down the 3rd run. *Firestopping* posted their second win with *Brickmans' Wines* again 2nd followed by Julian Bolleter and Chris Madin in *Fujitsu*.



Day 2 saw the first of the 9am starts in a 10-12 knot NE. Hunt Leather and Priority Powder Coating got out before the race for a little pre race research and, after establishing the favoured side of the course, both boats hit the left hard up the 1st work and led at the 1st mark. Abby promptly fell off her boat with excitement but managed to climb back aboard in time to lead at the end of the 1st lap. The Nudists again demonstrated their downwind skills to sail their way back into the race with Priority Powder Coating, Hunt Leather and The Nude fighting it out up the 2nd work. Firestopping was sitting back in 5th place but as usual worked their way through the fleet as the race wore on. The usual close race saw the heavier crew of Priority Powder Coating ease into the front upwind with the lighter, younger and smarter crews of Hunt Leather and The Nude passing them on the downwind leg to set up a close final work. At the top mark the last time, Firestopping benefited from keeping their heads out of the boat to lead at the last mark and Firestopping and The Nude fought a close tactical race down the last work before The Nude crossed the line just ahead despite thinking they had finished 2nd. This was the first time they were observed to kiss, a practice that proved to be unique to this boat and crew, leading to a fairly lively discussion amongst the rest of the fleet about the benefits of kissing in The Nude. John Perry and Greg Dodd demonstrated their ongoing improvement by sailing Perry's Finance into 6th place behind a very nervous Priority Powder Coating.



Race 5 was commenced immediately after Race 4 in the dying morning NE. Hunt Leather chose to cross the line early at the start in order to give the rest of the fleet a chance and had to double back and restart. This lead to yet another close 1st work between Firestopping, The Nude, Hunt Leather and Priority Powder Coating and some excellent video footage of Abby having a bit of a dummy spit. These positions were retained down the 1st run before Priority Powder Coating took the lead up the 2nd work as the breeze began to die back into the north. At the top mark the 2nd time Priority Powder Coating led Firestopping by 2-3 boat lengths with The Nude falling into a hole about 100 metres before the 1st mark. As the breeze continued to clock around to the NNW, Firestopping slipped straight through Priority Powder Coating's lee to win the shortened race at the end of the 2nd downwind leg. 9 boats managed to drift over the line before the race committee blew the gun to signify the end to the 20 minute time limit. No wind for the rest of the day justified the race committee's decision to start racing earlier in the day.

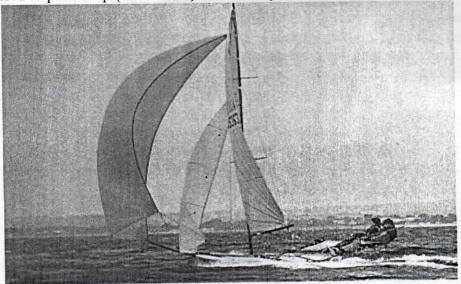
RACE 6

Another 9am start for Race 6 bought 20 knots from the S (190°) with Victorian sailors Stephen Grailey and Graham Doreian living up to their name (It's hard to be humble) by jumping off the middle of the starting line. Brickmans' Wines again demonstrated their preference for heavy weather sailing with a good lead at the 1st mark ahead of Firestopping and Priority Powder Coating. A spectacular ditch by Chris and Duncan down the 1st reach of the triangular course allowed the remainder of the fleet back into the race. With B14's unused to sailing triangular courses, it made for some interesting tight reaching. Firestopping chose to drop their kite at the gybe mark allowing Priority Powder Coating back into the race until they had difficulty dropping their spinnaker at the bottom mark. Glen Smith and Kirby Haynrs also showed their heavy weather prowess by settling into 3rd place behind Priority Powder Coating and Firestopping. On the final reach of the race, Firestopping's rudder box blew up while Priority Powder Coating, almost simultaneously, folded another centreboard over to begin a spectacular sideways slide (perfectly captured on video for the amusement of all sailors that evening in the Club house). White Pointer took out their 1st race of the series by sailing conservatively to win the war of attrition. Firestopping proved their prowess as escape artists by pulling their spinnaker down, repairing their rudder box, getting upright and sailing into 3rd place (which proved to be their drop anyway). The fleet headed back to the club for a civilised lunch and lie down before heading back out into a 20 knot Southerly for 2 back to back races in the afternoon.

Priority Powder Coating proved that fat is fast up the 1st work but was forced to ditch the boat to repair the tack of the jib, effectively throwing away the race. Firestopping and The Nude flew down the 1st run to set up a close race which saw Firestopping again lead with Richie Reynolds and Lisa McMillan second (an exceptional effort for the lightweight crew in a 20 knot breeze). This consistency and Lisa McMillan's athletic hiking (a skill which saw her anointed the world wall sitting championships at last years B14 world championships at the Sydney Flying Squadron) proved to be the key to their second place overall in the regatta.

RACE 8

Race 8 saw 20 knots from the South continue with very little variation in direction of the breeze. Priority Powder Coating, The Nude, Brickmans' Wines and Firestopping again fought out the 1st work, with Firestopping easing to the lead after taking advantage of the left hand side of the course on the 2nd work. The final downwind leg saw a line of pressure hit the fleet not long after they had gybed onto the lay line forcing a number of boats to struggle to lay the line. The Nude, again well placed, unfortunately overlaid the finish line and actually had to drop their spinnaker and sail back to the finish allowing Brickmans' Wines and Hunt Leather to sneak through in front of them. Fujitsu was also in the hunt until the end finishing 6th. Ubiquitous photographer, Phil Johnson was again on hand with his video camera to capture the dummy spit of the series by Lissa McMillan who refused to pucker up (in the nude) immediately after the race.



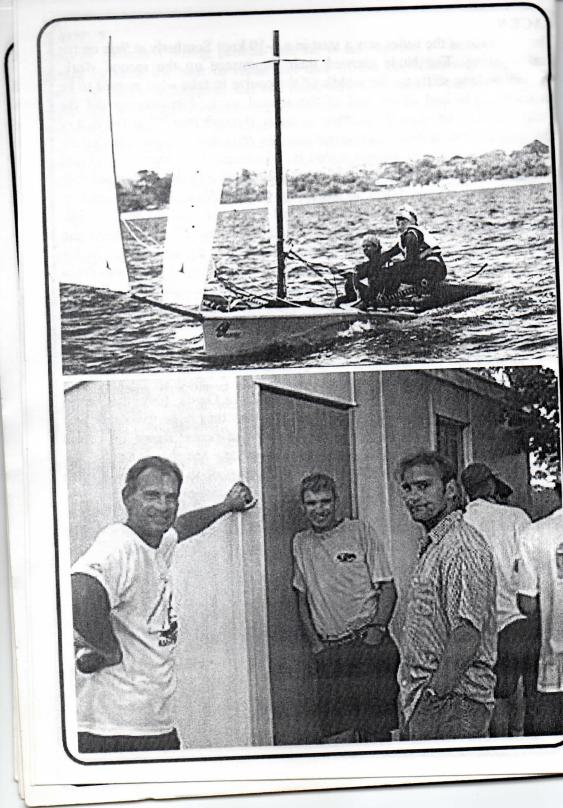
The final race of the series saw a start in a 5-10 knot Southerly at 9am on the final morning. The Nude showed their dominance up the second work, skilfully picking shifts up the middle of the course to take what proved to be an unassailable lead at the end of the second work. Firestopping did the usual recovery act from 5th position to sneak through into 2nd at the end of the race. Light conditions throughout the race provided probably the shiftiest race of the series with interest added by a number of dolphins who played amongst the boats throughout the race. A 20° shift into the left up the final work allowed several boats to close up on The Nude who managed to wineglass their spinnaker doing a windward set on the final run to the finish. Several gybes later they held their lead and sailed into 2nd spot overall and sat back and watched the rest of the fleet come over the line. Hunt Leather sailed into 3rd and began a tense wait to see if White Pointer could run down Priority Powder Coating in order to share their 3rd spot on points. Priority Powder Coating however managed to hold White Pointer out, placing Abby and Sophie firmly in 3rd place on their own. White Pointer and Brickmans' Wines shared 4th place overall, 1 point behind with White Pointer prevailing in a count back.

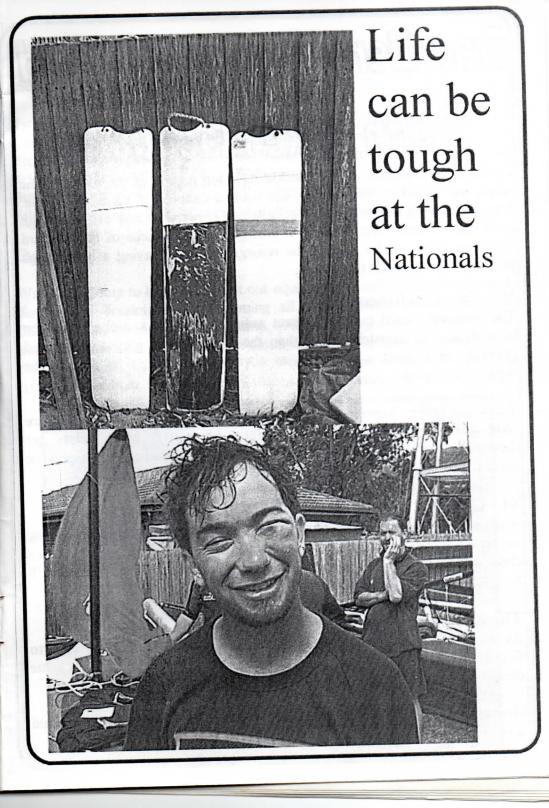
SUMMARY

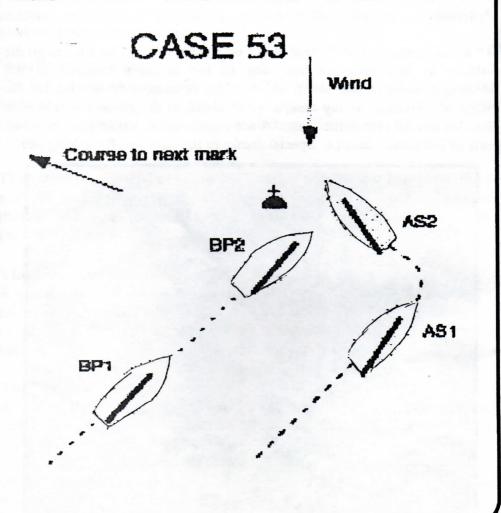


Know Your Racing Rules

From the Case book to you-

Rule 2, Fair Sailing Rule 14, Avoiding Contact Rule 15, Acquiring Right of Way

A boat is not required to anticipate that another boat will break a rule. In a changing situation, a newly-obligated boat is entitled to time for response.



Summary of the Facts

AS, a hull length to leeward and a hull length ahead of BP, tacked as soon as she reached the starboard layline. Almost immediately she was hit and holed by BP travelling at about ten knots. The protest committee disqualified AS for breaking rule 15. It also disqualified BP under rule 2, pointing out that she knew AS was going to tack but did nothing to avoid collision. BP appealed, asserting that she was not obligated to anticipate an illegal tack.

Decision

Appeal upheld. BP is reinstated.

When AS passed through head to wind, BP became the right-of-way boat and held right of way until AS assumed a close-hauled course on starboard tack. At that moment AS, having just acquired right of way under rule 10, was required by rule 15 to give BP room to keep clear. BP took no action to avoid a collision, but what could she have done? Given her speed and the distance involved, she had perhaps one to two seconds to decide what to do and then do it. It is a long-established underlying principle of the right-ofway rules, as stated in rule 15, that a boat that becomes obligated to keep clear by an action of another boat is entitled to sufficient time for response. Also, while it was obvious that AS would have to tack to round the mark, BP was under no obligation to anticipate that she would break rule 15. BP broke neither rule 2 nor rule 14.
